SHOWING LOVE TO THE MOST VULNERABLE

Sisters Srinidhi* and Mahira* are Sri Lankan refugees who have been living in refugee camps in India for decades. Like many refugees from Sri Lanka, they were forced to flee due to the conflict and violence in their home country.

They are both widows who lost their husbands while in India and after all these years, they have never lived apart. Despite being independent, travelling outside the camp to the nearest hospital is too difficult, particularly with Mahira's health problems.

Srinidhi explained, "Can't you see my sister? She can't even walk, how is she going to go to the hospital? That's why we want the hospital to come to us, the

health workers to come to us. She comes and sees me regularly."

Fortunately, Act for Peace's local partner in India, Organization for Eelam Refugees Rehabilitation (OfERR), which is run by refugees themselves, have been providing crucial support and assistance in the camps for four decades.



SHARING GOD'S LOVE

Meh Reh fled Myanmar more than 29 years ago. Living in a refugee camp on the Thai-Burma border ever since, he hopes that one day it will be safe for him and his family to return home.

Meh Reh explained, "Personally, my wish is to go back home... but it depends on the political situation in Myanmar... If the political situation is not stable, we cannot go back. If we go back, we will face many problems".

Thousands continue to flee Myanmar to this day, but with the emergency no longer in the headlines, they are left out of sight and out of mind, trapped in a devastating limbo. Meh Reh prays that the world hasn't

forgotten them.

"It is difficult to survive, to earn an income for our family," says Meh Reh. "It is difficult for our children to go for further study, and we have limited opportunities and have limited food."

At a time when more people than ever are forced to flee their homes, lifesaving aid is being stretched too thin, leaving many refugees Meh Reh and his family struggle to make ends
